## **THE APPOINTMENT**

The Bishop of Dorchester and the Team Rector are seeking to appoint a Team Vicar to serve the parish of Woodcote in the Langtree Team Ministry. The Langtree Team is in a large area of outstanding natural beauty and lies at the southern end of the Chilterns. It is in the Henley Deanery and the Dorchester Archdeaconry of the Diocese of Oxford. The village of Woodcote is in that part of the Langtree Team area where the land rises out of the Goring gap. It is surrounded by fields and beech woods and the local area is criss-crossed with footpaths and bridle paths maintained by the Chiltern Society.

The Langtree Team was formed in 1981 from the parishes of Checkendon, Stoke Row and Woodcote. In 1993 it was enlarged to include the parishes of Ipsden and North Stoke with Mongewell. The Team was further enlarged in 2003 to include the combined parish of Whitchurch on Thames and Whitchurch Hill.

The Team's complete ministerial staff has the Team Rector serving Checkendon and Stoke Row, a stipendiary Team Vicar at Woodcote and non-stipendiary Associate Priests on a house-for-duty basis serving (a) Ipsden and North Stoke and (b) Whitchurch on Thames and Whitchurch Hill. There is a Licensed Lay Minister (Reader), a non-stipendiary Team Pastor, 4 Authorised Preachers, a licensed lay pastoral assistant and a part time Administrator.

The Langtree Team staff provide support for the parishes in developing their response to local ministry needs. Churchmanship across the parishes is central and unfussy.

Each parish in the Team has its own churchwardens and PCC. Each appoints two representatives to the Team Council which meets quarterly. Parishes contribute funds to cover the expenses of the Team, for the staff, team office and parish requisites, but in every other way the parishes are financially independent of each other. Each parish maintains one or two church buildings and a churchyard, the parish quotas are paid in full, and all buildings are in good order. The Team Office at Stoke Row has copying and printing facilities, and the paid Administrator is available to assist all the clergy staff team in the desk-bound aspects of ministry. Our Team website and Woodcote Church Facebook page give good perspectives on the ministry we share.

The Team's main priorities are the provision of worship on a regular basis at each of the member churches and pastoral care that is both realistic and appropriate. There are many opportunities for Christian witness and fellowship in the communities that we serve, and the Team Council encourages an adaptable, creative response to these by PCCs and staff team members.

Whilst the Team Vicar vacancy will be primarily involved with parochial ministry in Woodcote, the Team staff are expected to be flexible in their approach to ministry so that, for example, holiday leave or other absences may be covered elsewhere in the Team.






# THE VILLAGE OF WOODCOTE



South Oxfordshire



The Parishes of the Langtree Team Ministry



The Village of Woodcote

Woodcote is the largest village in the Langtree Team Ministry. It has almost 3000 inhabitants, many of whom work in London and Reading as well as locally. It is an 'open village' which, though modern in appearance, has yielded artifacts that date back into pre-history.

The village spreads out from the village green (and neighbouring allotments) and boasts a large village hall, library, community centre, two public houses, two general shops and a small supermarket. It also has a garden centre, mobile Post Office (visiting 3 days a week), a GP surgery, hairdresser, fish and chip shop and visiting mobile pizza oven. There is a Roman Catholic church built in the 1950s and served by a priest living in Goring on Thames.



Within Woodcote there are two pre-schools, a primary school and a secondary school, Langtree School, all rated 'Good' by Ofsted. There is also an independent prep school and secondary school, The Oratory, rated 'Excellent' and 'Good' respectively. Within the other parishes of the Langtree Team there are primary schools in Checkendon (C/E), Stoke Row (C/E) and Whitchurch on Thames.



There are hourly buses (more frequent at peak times) from Woodcote to Oxford and Reading. There are regular train services to Oxford, Reading and London from Goring on Thames and Pangbourne. Both Pangbourne and Goring on Thames are well furnished with coffee shops and restaurants. The market town of Wallingford is a fifteen-minute drive away with supermarkets, a theatre / cinema, weekly markets, a small museum and a variety of shops and eateries.

Woodcote is a lively community with a host of village organisations and activities. A flavour of the village can be gained from reading the village monthly magazine 'The Woodcote Correspondent' [www.woodcoteparishcouncil.org.uk/Woodcote-Correspondent](http://www.woodcoteparishcouncil.org.uk/Woodcote-Correspondent) .

*Swimming and gym* is available at the Oratory school and there are various yoga, fitness and sports classes held at the village hall and in the schools

*Smellie-wellies Animal Farm* is an animal charity that offers therapeutic visits and parties

There is an active *WI* and a '*Chance to Chat*' group

A *Baby and Toddler Group* is associated with one of the pre-schools

A monthly *Craft & Produce Fair* is held in the school hall

There is an annual *Village Fete* held on the green with produce and crafts show in the village hall and a *Steam Rally*



*Woodcote Volunteers* is a 'Good Neighbour' Scheme which provides lifts to residents who are elderly, disabled or have a health condition and do not have access to a car or public transport

*Woodcote Community Library* is open 5 days a week with all the facilities of a 'big' library and runs weekday and Saturday children's activities

*Woodcote Saturday Coffee Shop* is run by local charities (including St Leonard's Church) on an occasional basis in the Community Centre

*Scouts and Guides* meet in Crays Pond at the edge of the village ([www.1stgoringheath.org.uk](http://www.1stgoringheath.org.uk))




**ST LEONARD'S CHURCH**



St. Leonard's church dates from the 12<sup>th</sup> century. It is a grade 2\* listed building. It was completely rebuilt in 1846 and some of the original external walls of the chancel and apse may have been incorporated into the new building. It has an interesting history since it was originally the daughter church to the then parish church in the neighbouring village of South Stoke. It was separated from South Stoke and became part of the Langtree team in 1981.

The church has a bell tower in an open western turret containing a bell some 3 inches thick and weighing half a ton. There is a small, neat gallery at the west end of the church, a stone pulpit and stone font both of which are decorated with illuminated text. The church has stained-glass windows in the chancel and nave. The triplet of windows in the east end of the chancel has Christ flanked by St Leonard and St Andrew. The nave contains memorial windows to former parishioners. Wooden rafters support the roof, bearing shields depicting the four apostles. The church seats approximately 120 people. The electoral roll (2021) for the parish of Woodcote was 88. The churchyard has a peaceful Garden of Remembrance. Spring and early summer find the churchyard at its best with a colourful array of flowers edging the path.



There are 2 services each Sunday with average attendance of 10 and 40 people. An online Compline service is held on Wednesday evenings with attendance of 10 - 14 people. St Leonard's has a small music group which plays at the Open Door and SLOW church services. Over the past 5 years there have been 17 baptisms, 10 weddings and 32 funerals - these figures have been somewhat skewed because of the Covid pandemic.

Planning has recently started for a building project which will install a toilet and improve the layout in the church. An architect has been consulted and outline plans and costing have been obtained to:

- install a toilet (with associated works) in the rear vestry
- create a more open 'circulation' space at the back of the church by moving or replacing the organ. The aim being to install a servery for refreshments or create a small, screened meeting area.



A working group has been convened to move this project on.

The church is very much at the heart of the community and takes part in, and initiates, many village activities. Church members are actively involved in many of the organisations listed earlier and St Leonard’s fundraising events are well supported by the village. The church is open daily and often visited for silent reflection.

We are fortunate to have an active ‘friends’ organisation supporting St Leonard’s. *Friends of St Leonard’s* (FOSLs) was set up in 2009 by a group of volunteers with the object of raising funds to help maintain and preserve the fabric of the church building and churchyard. FOSLs are independent of the Church of England and the money raised is not used to support the religious activities of the church. Funds are raised from village residents and Friends via regular annual or monthly subscriptions or donations. To date the FOSLs have raised over £26,000 to assist with building repairs inside and outside of the building and churchyard maintenance.

## **WOODCOTE PARISH PRIORITIES**

It will be important for our new priest to work closely with the PCC to build on current initiatives and evolve our ministry to meet the needs of the parish. In the past 13 years St Leonard's has expanded the following areas of ministry:

*Development of service provision:* Introduction of the Open Door and In Loving Memory services within the church. Also, Open Air and SLOW (St Leonard's Outside the Walls) Church services on the Village Green and in the Village Hall. Introduction of creative worship for Christingle and crib service. Set up a music group. Introduction of contemplative 'Big Silences' and Compline. Creation of online services during lockdowns and for weekly Compline

*Development of shared and lay ministry:* Extending those involved in worship through reading, intercessions and assisting at communion. Introduction of Worship Committee and enabling worship leaders and Authorised Preachers. Appointment of Lay Pastoral Assistant for visiting and provision of home communion

*Learning and Teaching:* Introduction of Lent groups and a Confirmation group which is now developing into a study group

*Improved publicity and communications:* use of a recognisable logo, presence on social media, creation of banners and posters, Christmas cards for all homes in the village

*Outreach and fellowship:* Messy Church (currently in abeyance), running Saturday coffee shops with coffee shop crafts, presence at village events, use of the church for concerts

We would expect the Team Vicar to utilise his or her particular skills, but the following areas for possible development in ministry have been identified by the church:

- Helping us to discern where God is at work in our village and seeing if there are ways that we, as a Christian community, can join in
- Connecting with local families, pre-schools, schools (particularly the secondary school) and Youth Club, developing relationships and exploring new forms of ministry with children and young adults
- Encouraging a younger demographic and families to our fellowship, for example by developing a shorter family-friendly Communion Service and finding ways to involve children in the services
- Continue developing our input in the monthly village publication the Woodcote Correspondent through the Vicar's letter
- Foster ecumenical links with other local churches
- Working with the PCC and others to increase the flexibility of the church building to make it suitable for the needs of our 21<sup>st</sup> century community

The above is a simple outline of the basic pattern of worship at St Leonard's. On a given Sunday there are between 7 and 10 services held across the Team Churches, in a wide variety of styles. The Team Ministry offers seasonal templates for regular services such as Holy Communion. The Team Rector actively encourages each parish to develop and adapt its worship pattern to changing needs. The service plan also involves the Licensed Lay Minister, Authorised Preachers and other lay helpers.

Other worship at St Leonard's includes SLOW Church (St Leonard's Outside the Walls) held in the Village Hall 4 or 5 times a year. This service aims to move St Leonard's out into the community and offers an environment which is more flexible and family-friendly than the church space allows. In addition, we hold post-service Bring and Share lunches in the Village Hall, open air services on the village green or in the churchyard, an annual 'In Loving Memory' service (where we recall those we have loved and lost), Christingle, Carols on the Green, welcoming the primary and pre-schools at harvest and Christmas and weekly online Compline.

There are a variety of small groups led by the Team Vicar, including an annual Lent group and a group following the Pilgrim course. Confirmation classes are run according to demand. Three adults were confirmed this year, for example. Baptism preparation is undertaken individually. There is room for exploration in this area of ministry at St Leonard's.

## **PERSON SPECIFICATION**

As a village community we would welcome any practical and spiritual gifts you may bring. In addition to this we are looking for the following qualities in the new Team Vicar:

- A firmly grounded personal faith expressed with tolerance and a sense of humour
- A gift of spiritual discernment to see God's hand at work in individuals, the church and in the wider community
- A realistic, down to earth, unfussy nature. You'll need to be easy-going and approachable, wise and well organised
- Preaching that is accessible for Christians and seekers alike, to encourage us to deepen our faith and help us on our pilgrimage as a church family
- Supportive of ongoing projects, for example the reorganisation of the rear of the church
- Comfortable with both the new and the old in worship, whether in church or "outside the walls"
- A willingness to participate in community life and to be a visible presence in the village, especially in the schools, pre-school, and at community events
- A proven ability to work collaboratively. You will depend upon lay helpers in the parish and contribute to the support and fellowship of colleagues across the Team Ministry. They, in turn, will depend upon you
- Some technical skills you'll need include being up to date with your safeguarding training and knowing how to run a working graveyard. You'll also know where to get help! You'll be computer literate and comfortable with social media. You'll have a full UK driving licence
- We'd like someone who has a real desire to help us develop our church, by joining our journey and exploring the story that God is writing with us

## **DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES**

The postholder will be licensed to the Team with special responsibility for the Parish of Woodcote, assuming the role of Team Vicar. They will reside rent free in the Vicarage in Woodcote.

It will be a full-time stipendiary appointment and involve deputising for the Team Rector as necessary. The postholder is expected to carry out all the usual pastoral and ministerial responsibilities of an incumbent, including chairing the PCC (or sharing this task with the lay vice-chairman) and attendance at the quarterly Team Council meetings.

The postholder should expect to participate fully in all the activities of the Team, which will include taking services in other churches in the Team, attendance at weekly Staff meetings, covering for sickness or holiday and, following consultation with the Team Rector, any other specialist or general pieces of ministry (for example, involvement with the local schools and pre-schools). Attendance at the Deanery Chapter is expected as is sharing in the life of the Henley Deanery.

A working agreement will be drawn up and reviewed annually with the Team Rector, to whom the postholder is accountable. Expenses are reimbursed in full in accordance with Diocesan guidelines. Broadband is paid for, and the Team ministry operates an IT hardware replacement scheme. An allowance is made in the Team budget for retreats and training.

A CRB Enhanced Disclosure is required for this post, and the postholder will be required to have completed any safeguarding courses required by the Diocese and to keep these up to date as required by the Team Rector or the Diocese.

## THE OTHER PARISHES OF THE LANGTREE TEAM MINISTRY

### Checkendon



This pretty village has about 470 inhabitants. The medieval church of SS Peter & Paul dates from 1152 and unique wall paintings were discovered at the turn of the millennium. Checkendon is an “iconic” church which attracts many worshippers and visitors to its sacred space. There was a complete re-roofing in 2012 at a cost of over £300,000. The church

can seat approximately 120 people and like all the Langtree Churches has an open churchyard. There is a flourishing C of E (aided) primary school, with about 60 pupils which has a close relationship with the Church. There is a village hall, preschool, equestrian centre, excellent pub, farm shop and several small businesses.

### Stoke Row

This woodland parish has a small Victorian flint church built in 1846. There is a population of about 640 people and the village has a C of E (Aided) school with about 80 pupils. There is a village hall, sports pavilion, garage, lively shop and cafe and two pubs. There is also a non-conformist Chapel served by a resident Baptist minister. Stoke Row is a very active village, with many local clubs and organisations.



The parish church and Team ministry collaborate with the Chapel and the school in many areas. St John’s might be the smallest church in the Team, but it is very forward thinking. It was the first church in the Team to have an integral toilet and kitchen, and the imaginative reordering has enabled the school to use the building as their hall under licence for four days a week during term time. Last year St Johns became the first church in the Team to offer WiFi Internet.

## Whitchurch on Thames

Whitchurch on Thames is the second largest village in the Team ministry area. The combined population with Whitchurch Hill is about 1800. As well as the facilities and natural beauty of the river Thames in this part of the Chilterns AONB, Whitchurch has a pub, a village hall, and a state primary school. Crossing the river via the Toll Bridge (60p per car) gives access to the amenities of Pangbourne; the surgery, shops, garages, library and mainline railway station making journeys to both Reading, and London fast and convenient.

The ancient parish church of St Mary the Virgin, the largest church building in the Team, is largely the result of Victorian rebuilding by Henry Woodyer, although fragments of the medieval fabric remain.

## Whitchurch Hill

Up the hill from Whitchurch on Thames lies the smaller sister settlement of Whitchurch Hill. Most of this village comes under the aegis of Goring Heath Parish Council. Whitchurch Hill is a more rural community than Whitchurch on Thames, with one pub, but no shop or school and a one day a week bus to Reading.

The Church of St John the Baptist is an Anglican chapel of ease built and consecrated in 1883 for the uphill residents in opposition to the then thriving Methodist chapel (now closed). It is a simple building of flint and stone with tiled roofs and paired lancet windows, comprising chancel and nave in one, with an apsidal east end and a north vestry.

## Ipsden

Ipsden is a working community of about 300 people. It has the last remaining post office in the Team area, which is the hub of the village. The hamlet of Hailey falls within the parish and includes the popular King William IV pub with its magnificent views across the Chilterns. The local economy is mainly agricultural, but also within the village there are several thriving small businesses.



There is a private nursery school, a well-supported cricket club, Village Hall and website. Ipsden is an artistic community. The St Mary's Players is a lively and enthusiastic church-based drama group, who have staged an annual village pantomime for more than 15 years

## North Stoke & Mongewell

North Stoke is an attractive Thames-side village popular with commuters travelling to London and those in retirement for its peace and quiet. The Ridgeway footpath runs through the village and churchyard, so St Mary's church is regularly visited by walkers. North Stoke is currently a parish of about 200 people with a village hall and a golf course, but this is set to increase with the anticipated development of the Carmel College site in the hamlet of Mongewell. The 13<sup>th</sup> century flint church of St Mary with its unique medieval wall paintings seats up to 100 people and the churchyard is well maintained. St John's College, Cambridge are responsible for the maintenance of the chancel.

To apply for this post, you'll need to be an ordained priest in the Anglican Communion, with incumbency status, and in good standing with your Diocesan Bishop. If you are currently in a curacy you will need to have passed the end of curacy assessment and have a letter from your Bishop confirming your curacy is completed. On the date of your application, you will need to hold a valid UK passport or have been granted permanent leave to remain and work in the UK. You will also need a full and current UK driving license. Evidence of any academic qualifications listed on your application at degree level or above will need to be presented and an enhanced DBS disclosure will be required.


