Letter from the Vicar



Mark Twain once wrote in response to a rumour about him, 'the report of my death was an exaggera-tion.' Something similar could be said about the Christian church in this country. For many years the standard story told about the church in the media

has been one of decline, supposedly terminal. Alongside falling church attendance figures, the results of the 2021 UK National Census were widely reported, with the number of people identifying as Christian dropping below 50% for the first time (46.2% compared to 59.3% in 2011) and the number of people ticking the "no religion" box rising by 12% to 37.2%. If the trend continued then the end of the church in the UK was surely in sight. And yet ...

A Quiet Revival?

Evidence has come to light this year suggesting that reports of the death, or at least the imminent demise, of the Christian church in the UK are an exaggeration, Back in April, Bible Society published a report based on YouGov polling of over 13,000 adults in 2024, called A Quiet Revival. Far from reporting an expected decline in church attendance, the research sugge sted an increase in regular church attendance from 8% of the pop ulation in 2018 to 12% in 2024. The increase was especially noticeable in young adults, with 16% of 18-24 year-olds saying that they attended church regularly, compared to just 4% in 2018. For young men, the figure was 21%. While the report does have its doubters, other statistical and anecdotal evidence does support the picture that something surprising is going on, especially among members of Generation Z (roughly those born between 1997 and 2012). Nationally it seems that the youngest generations are becoming more open to faith in God and the Christian message than the two or three generations before them. Here in Whitchurch, we have seen church attendance rising slowly but steadily since our churches reopened after Covid. And people seem especially drawn to church over the Christmas period. Over 350 people

came to one of the Christingle services on Christmas Eve in 2024, compared to 227 in 2019 and 180 in 2018. Now, as with the Bible Society sur vey figures, it is hard to pin down the reasons for these increases. People come to church looking for all kinds of things, from reassurance and belonging to hope and having something to believe in. No doubt at Christmas there is a heavy dollop of no stalgia as well. But I wonder if people in our community are becoming more open to considering, or reconsiderng, the Christian faith and what it might mean for their lives

With that in mind, I'm in the process of planning a pop-up book club exploring questions of Christian faith and spirituality which will read one book in Advent and one in the New Year. The Advent meeting is likely to be in the second week of December, but further details will be on the church noticeboard, website and in my vicar's email (see below).

St. Mary's Youth Club expanding

In other news, it has been wonderful to see the St. Mary's Youth Club expand from three year groups when we started in April 2024, to four in September 2024 and five in September this year. We now run three hour long sessions in the Old Rectory Stables on a Friday night, with 40 to 50 young people in school years 6 to 10 attending across the three sessions most weeks. Our focus continues to be providing a safe space for young people to meet and have fun together engaging in a variety of games and activities, with a pool table donated by St. Stephen's church in Upper Basildon being a popular recent addition.

There are many more encouraging things going on in the life of the church and I am hugely grateful to everyone who contributes to our shared life, not least to those in the Friends of St. Mary's and St. John's and others who are supporting the Save Our Spire appeal so generously (see the update elsewhere in this magazine). Far from being in terminal decline, our vision and hope is to be a community of faith that embodies God's love for every generation in this community for years and years to

What do we know about the next Archbishop of Canterbury?



Most people will have heard that the next Archbishop of Canterbury is to be a woman - the first ever! She is the current Bishop of London, the Rt Revd and Rt Hon Dame Sarah Mullally. Bishop Sarah will be installed in a service at Canterbury Cathedral in March 2026.

Bishop Sarah became a Christian at the age of 16. Prior to her ordination in 2001 she was the Government's Chief Nursing Officer for England – the youngest person ever to be appointed to that role at the age of 37 - having previously specialised as a cancer nurse. However her nursing career began with training at St Thomas' Hospital where Sarah Dragonetti was also undertaking her nurse training and they worked together as "hands on" junior staff. Sarah recalls

"At that time. I was either a senior student or a newly qualified nurse. Sarah Mullally was an intake or two behind me and was a 2nd year student nurse . She would report to me when we worked together and it was common practice at that time that senior student nurses and junior staff nurses were often in charge, especially during a late shift, at night, or over the weekend. The ward was for men only, and specialised in gastrointestinal disorders. When I was in charge I would often arrive at work with a mixture of excitement and apprehension as to what challenges might occur during my 8 hour shift, due to frequent staff shortages or the condition of patients who required high levels of nursing care.

I always looked forward to working with Sarah as I saw that she was an extremely dependable person, and showed great compassion and calmness as a nurse as well as being able to function in an environ ment where multi-tasking and efficiency was important. I could completely trust her to look after the sickest patients on the ward whilst I oversaw and managed the whole ward. When she became Chief Nurse I was delighted as she had demonstrated to me what a kind and capable person she was."

Bishop Steven also welcomed news of Bishop Sarah's appo "This is an historic announcement for the Church of England and for the Anglican Communion. I warmly commend our Archbishop designate Dame Sarah Mullaly and her family to the prayers and affections of the Diocese of Oxford. Sarah will bring proven wisdom, love, dedication and vision to her new role.

100 YEARS AGO

Here is an excerpt from the Whitchurch Parish magazine of December 1925 which gives a fascinating insight into what work with young people looked like

THE C.L.B. [Church Lads Brigade] The six weeks' probation are over and 14 out
of the 15 lads who joined have held fast and reached the stage of enrolment.
Although from past experience of clubs and societies in Whitchurch some have

signs of grit and determination which promises well for the future. When one _____ members that some of the lads are working three or four miles away from the arish and yet face our hill at the close of the day, even in inclement weather, it

The lads enjoy the physical drill on Monday evenings and Mr. <u>Chiyers,</u> their i structor is pleased with the progress made. I have been telling them the me ing of the title "Church Lads Brigade". Each of the three words conveys the noion of some virtue at which the C.L.B. aims, namely, "Godliness," "Manliness, and "Comradeship."

We do not aspire to uniform nor are we forming a band as yet. Meanwhile we ear the badge and some are practising the mouth-organ with a view to outdo narching.

On Thursdays Mr. A. Lambourne takes charge for boxing to develop the muscle and make the lads alert. Mr R. Stockley has kindly given another pair of gloves and comes down to help the lads to make the right use of them. A second-hand cinghy has been purchased and the lads are learning about the management of s boat and hope in the spring-time to put their knowledge into practice.

Although a new organization in this neighbourhood, the Church Lads Bri gade is well established. It was started on St. Martin's Day, November 1th, 1891, and since that time over 1,000,000 lads have passed through its ranks. 25,000 old members died in the war, and old C.L.B. lands w 22 Victoria Crosses.

[Note – the Church Lads Brigade in Whitchurch lasted until 1933.]


